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W.N.S. in 1960.

During the year the Society continued to flourish and considerable progress was made in fieldwork by members, especially in the Survey of Ilkley Moor, and bird ringing. The wildfowl counts have new been done for ten years, so the records for this period are summarised in the report.

For several years the Society has been without an Entomological recorder; it is gratifying that we now have two, one for Lepidoptera and one for other insects, and the work of the Entomology Section is going on steadily. Geological study has also been helped by the appointment of a secretary for the Geology Section.

Membership has increased during the year to 188:

5 honorary members, 145 ordinary members, and 38 juniors. The accounts in March 1960 showed a satisfactory balance in hand, but owing to increased costs all round there was a slight deficit on the year's working. It was not considered necessary to raise the subscription which remains at 10/- for seniors and 2/6 for juniors. However the Committee opened a Research Fund to be available for special needs in connection with fieldwork, leaving the regular income for current expenses.

The Annual Dinner was attended by over 70 members and friends, the chief guest being Mr. R. Hallam of Lincoln who afterwards showed some of his excellent monochrome slides of birds. Mr. and Mrs. Chislett were also present, and Mr. Chislett showed some slides.

In the summer the Tuesday evening excursions and the Saturday afternoon outing were very well attended and none were cancelled.

The full day excursion to Hillbeck Woods and Sunbiggin Tarn in Westmorland proved both popular and successful, and the party was met by Dr. K.C. Crosbie, Mr. R.W. Robson and other local naturalists.

A competition for junior members was held again, the winners being Thomas Dewdney and Jeremy Baker.

The latest R.S.P.B. Colour Film, Sea-Bird Summer, was hired by the Society for an open meeting which was well attended.

An enjoyable event took place when the Society entertained the Ilkley Camera Club for a natural history colour slide competition. The judge was Mr. L. Clayton of Leeds, and the result W.N.S. 193 points I.C.C. 178 points.

The Society has kept up contacts with nearby local Naturalists' Societies, the Yorkshire Naturalists' Union, the Council for Nature and the Yrokshire Naturalists' Trust. As a result of the £50 subscription specially raised for the Trust by the open meeting in January 1960, the Society is now a life member of the Trust.

### SURVEY OF ILKLEY MOOR

Much of the fieldwork of the Society in 1960 has centred on this survey, which is a communal effort of the members, all sections being represented. In due course it is hoped to have results worthy of publication; there is a lot still to be done, for although the first year's work has yielded some very interesting information it has also opened up many problems and shown gaps in our knowledge of the plants and animals and their ecology on the Moor.

In the autumn an exhibition was held in the Playhouse to show members and the general public the work which had been done. The exhibits were staged in the Green Room, and in the Theatre, after an official opening by Councillor J.R. Armistead, Chairman of the Ilkley U.D.C. Moor and Parks Committee, two showings of colour slides of the Moor were presented.

Three typed copies of the results of the Survey have been produced. Two of these have been bound, one belonging to the Society and one given to the Ilkley Public Library, both of which may be borrowed by members of the Society.

The Sectional Reports in this issue of the Transactions include the more important records from the moorland survey.

A special study of the ecology of Crowberry was made and the account of this has been accepted for publication in The Naturalist.

The Editor of the Ilkley Gazette asked the Society for a series of four short articles about the Survey. These were published in the Gazette at fortnightly intervals in January and February 1961.

Our thanks are due to many who have, by their interest and practical help, encouraged us in our work on the Survey, including Councillor J.R. Armistead; the Editor of the Ilkley Gazette; Ilkley Urban District Council; the Librarian of Ilkley Public Library; Miss Bertha Lonsdale; Dr. W.A. Sledge, Editor of The Naturalist.

A valuable part of the work was the making of a vegetation map of the Moor, which was compared with one published in 1903. The two copies were shown at the exhibition, and since then in the Ilkley Public Library. At the Y.N.U. Annual Meeting (see below) the President made mention of these in his address.

### YORKSHIRE NATURALISTS' UNION

In December the Y.N.U. 99th A.G.M. was held in Ilkley by invitation of the Society. The Presidential Address was given by Dr. D.H. Valentine on The Future of the British Flora.

The Ilkley Moor exhibition was on view, and after tea there was a showing of the survey colour slides.

:The 1960 rainfall was 47.1 inches against the previous wettest year of 50.7 inches in 1872. Ilkley had 37.49 inches of rain so it was not as wet as some places. The years 1950, 51, 54 and 58 were all wetter years, with 42.24 inches in 1954. 1930 holds the record for the wettest year with 44.34 inches.

Many areas suffered from serious flooding. In the autumn the river Wharfe on a number of occasions ran bank high, but there was no widespread flooding of the countryside. Most of the autumn weather was polar-maritime in origin, which is usually free flowing air, so as a result there was little fog in autumn and on the whole the weather was mild with scarcely any snow.

The spring had some good weather, in May a maximum temperature of 75 degrees with 83 degrees in June. Whitsuntide was a glorious weekend with the May blossom whitening the hedgerows, surely a vintage year, and the attumn gave a rich harvest of haws of plump size and rich colour.

Once more I wish to thank the Ilkley Surveyor's office for supplying the weather data.

### GEOLOGICAL SECTION

During the past year, in connection with the general survey of the Moor, effort has been dire ted to a review of the geology south of Ilkley. Surface deposits were especially examined to assess generally the effect of glacially transported material on

the acidity.

At Lanshaw Delves (129454) in spite of all the past quarrying for limestone boulders, specimens were found which were highly fossiliferous and had surfaces etched by acid ground water. Decalcified pebbles of limestone of a type common in Yoredale beds were also found together with chert both fossiliferous and unfossiliferous. A single weathered crinoid ossicle was also collected.

At a point north of the Delves, a guartz crystal, about 13 mm. long, with well-formed and unabraded faces was discovered, and a second, equally clear and unworn, was found by a path to a quarry (128468). In view of their fresh state it is difficult to believe that these crystals came from the local grits but such crystals are common in residual soils on limestone and the inference is that they have been transported. Other items found included weathered ironstone bullions (boxstones), one of which rattled as a result of the unweathered core being detached from its limonitic Coldstone Beck (145452) yielded fossil Lepidodendra.

Over the moor generally limestone either as solid rock or as boulders in the sub-soil was seen to be singularly wanting. As mentioned above it exists in Lanshaw Delves and in Spicey Gill morainic deposits carried sparse pebbles. No doubt there are other local occurrences. In Spicey Gill, at Grid point 110467, some base-loving plants are established. One source of the bases is of course the morainic deposits upstream, but in the search for a more local source a bed of decalcified nodules was found - the nodules containing uncrushed goniatites and other fossils. It is thought that the bed represents a very thin limestone band comparable with that in Backstone Beck and as such would furnish some lime to the soil.

At two other stations with similar plants, no conclusions were reached as to the origin of the bases in view of the slipped

nature of the ground.

BOTANICAL SECTION

XV 1960

In early summer flowering of herbaceous plants was average, but the rainy weather later on was unfavourable and autumn flowering was very poor. Trees flowered and fruited very well as was expected after last year's sunshine record.

Hawthorn hedges were full of flower and produced plenty of fruit of good size. Elderberry flowers followed on with heavy

bunches and also a good crop of berries.

Ash trees, after a barren year in 1959 fruited extremely well. A good crop of seedlings grew up from the keys of 1958, the seeds of this species taking two years to germinate.

Beech had a notably good mast year, and most other trees bore

good fruit.

New Records

The following species have not been entered in the records

Silene gallica (Small-flowered catchfly) and S. armeria (Deptford pink) - both as garden weeds in Ikley, brought with seed <u> Ûrtica urens</u> (Small nettle) - garden weed in two places in Ben Rhydding and at Denton, and on a tip at Langbar. Hyoscyamus niger (Henbane) - Denton Clinopodium vulgare (Wild Basil) - Burley Woodhead

Ruscus aculcatus (Butcher's broom) - naturalised at Burley Ornithogallum umbellatum (Star of Bethlehem) - Ilkley, by river This plant also appeared in a plantation at Weston in 1959.

Carex spicata (Spiked sedge) - Troller's Ghyll.

New Stations A number of plants have been found in places where they have

not been recorded before: Asplenium trichomanes (Maidenhair spleenwort) - Burley Corydalis claviculata ( Climbing corydalis) - Weston Woods and West End.

Claytonia alsinoides (Pink purslane) - Burley and Ilkley. Ulex gallii (Western Gorse) - Beamsley.

Epilobium nerterioides (Creeping willow herb) \*- in a Middleton garden.

Carpinus betulinus (Hornbeam) - Burley. Quercus cerris (Turkey Oak) - Burley Woodhead, Salix alba (White willow) - Burley Woodhead.

Galcopsis speciosa (Bee hemp nettle) - Burley Woodhead.

Allium scorodoprasum (Sand leek) - Ilkley by river.
Epipactis helleborine (Broad helleborine) - Ilkley and Burley.

Listera cordata (Lesser twayblade) - Ilkley Moor.

\*Creeping willow herb is an alien species which appears to be spreading. It is usually found by streams where it colonises open ground, and as a garden weed. Any further records would be of interest, especially east of Ilkley, for its seeds, like those of all willow herbs are wind-dispersed,

Increase in Numbers

Records of less common plants which are either spreading or

holding their own are always welcome.

Genista Tinctoria (Dyer's greenweed) has formed a flourishing colony at Bon Rhydding. The Aconites at Burley have spread since the felling of nearby trees.

Swinsty Reservoir was allowed to run very low for repair work, and the exposed bed once more proved interesting.\* In particular

three species had increased to huge numbers:

Alopecurus aequalis (Orange foxtail) made large patches in places

on both sides of the reservoir.

Limosella aquatica (Common mudwort) was found on both sides, and at last year's station had spread so much as to form a close lawn-like patch some 38 by 30 yards, as well as extending for about 100 yards along the shore.

Littorella uniflora (Shore weed), which must have seeded very well in 1959, had produced seedlings in large numbers towards the

water's edge.

Visit to Grass Wood

On the excursion to Grass Wood it was found that the plants did not appear to have suffered from the tree felling operations. The Baneberry was still flourishing in a colony of ten plants

and one seedling, and the Fly orchids were also thriving. Globe flower, Burnet Rose, Herb Paris and both the Common and

Angular Solomon's Seal were all seen in flower.

Bindweeds

We have started an investigation of the distribution of the two white bindweeds, Calystegia sepium and C. silvatica. From observations so far it appears that C. sepium, the indigenous species is more common as a weed in old-established gardens, whilst the other springs in more recent waste ground and hedgerows. In some places the two grow together, and a search should be made for hybrids.

Botanical Society of the British Isles

The B.S.B.I. is investigating the status of various critical groups, including the distribution of Male and female Butterbur, the species of Celandine which has bulbils, Dandelion species, the varieties of Wild Radish and two species of Watercress.

Further details may be obtained from the recorder who would

be grateful for records and specimens in 1961.

FUNGI

The wet summer and autumn was very favourable for the growth of fungi, and Miss P. Walker recorded no less than 231 species. The following list gives the more interesting ones, including a few from the moorland list.

LEPIDOPTERA.

Apart from the large numbers of Small Tortoiseshell butterflies, out of hibernation, early in the season, this has not been a good butterfly year, probably because of the very wet summer. No Orange Tips, Wall Browns or Painted Ladies were recorded, but of special interest was the re-discovery of the Green Hairstreak.

Moths had a better season and several good species were recorded.

#### WILDFOWL COUNTS

Details of the wildfowl counts during 1960 are set out below in tabular form, with notes on additional species recorded. The Washburn Valley Reservoirs remained at a high water level over the period of the counts, and there was no period of freezing over during the year to affect the counts. It was noticeable that some of the rarer species of ducks were not recorded this year, but it must be emphasised that these records only refer to the Count Dates, and therefore it does not exclude the possibility of some

of these ducks being present on other dates.

Thanks are due to the observers who have helped in these counts and to the Leeds and Bradford Corporations Waterworks Departments for giving permission to visit the various reservoirs.

Some birds occasionally fly down to Swinsty reservoir. 3 were recorded on Lindley reservoir in Oct., Nov. and Dec. SMEW 1 female was seen on Swinsty on Dec. 18.

#### WILDFOWL COUNTS 1951 - 1960

To give ageneral picture of the numbers of wildfowl recorded in the past ten years, details are set out below. It is only possible to do this for the Washburn Valley reservoirs, as they are the only ones for which full details are available for the whole period. The totals have been obtained by adding together the numbers counted on Fewston, Swinsty and Lindley reservoirs, and they refer only to numbers seen on each particular count day in the month. No account has been taken of occasional counts of Farnley Lake, where Teal and Tufted Duck were usually recorded.

It must be pointed out that no mention is made of occasions when any of the reservoirs were frozen or partly frozen over, but it is hoped that these records may give a general picture of the numbers of ducks in the Washburn Valley, and also for future reference if necessary.

There seems to be a decline in the numbers of records of other ducks, such as Pintail, Shoveler, Goosander over the past ten years.
